FROM THE



RECTOR

A two year old, who knows how to identify the flowers, candles, gospel book, altar, and chalice. A five year old who, in the middle of the service, comes and kneels at the altar rail

and puts her hands out, ready to receive the Eucharist. An eight year old who fills in at short notice for an absent adult reader (our youngest filling in for our oldest!).

These are some of the children who, on a recent Sunday morning, made up over twenty percent of our congregation at 9:30 a.m. That's a wonderful sign of the vitality of our congregation. But it also brings its challenges. Younger children are, inevitably, more active and noisy than the vast majority of the congregation. But it also brings its challenges.

*"Worship is one of the basic ways people learn what it means to be Christian. Children increase their understanding of Christian worship by joining the congregation Sunday after Sunday. They*

*learn they belong to Christ and are welcome in his Church. They learn to know the Lord's Prayer and other parts of the liturgy from memory. They build a fund of memorable, shared experiences of Christian community against which they may draw when they are older. They are enriched by the beauty of music and art as expressions of praise and as human responses to God. They hear stories from the Bible read and interpreted and begin to see Christian worship as one place where God may speak to them. They witness the drama of Baptism and Eucharist as signs of God's kindness and favor. They discover that they are valued as persons by God and by the people of God at Church. Bringing children to worship may not always be easy, but it is an essential part of their growth in Christ. The Body of Christ assembled is incomplete in their absence. We need children!"*

So, how can we support one another, young and old(er) alike?

**For parents:**


- Bring your little ones up to the front pews after the peace, so they can see what is going on as we celebrate the Eucharist.
- Encourage children to participate. Having them sit, stand, and kneel with the congregation keeps them engaged. Our "Kids Communion" booklets have the service along with pictures to color, simple explanations, and the words of the service. Encourage children of school age to follow the service and sing with the hymns.
- Pick up the activity sheets that are available each week at the back of the church – we have separate ones for ages 3-6 and 7-12.
- Bring quiet snacks, favorite toys and paper for drawing and coloring.
- Make church a time when kids get extra snuggles.
- Don't be afraid to ask for help from other parishioners.
- If your child wanders up to the front during the service, don't worry. The adult acolytes, Eucharistic ministers, and I will keep an eye on them if they venture up into the space around the altar.
- Remind them to use their quiet voices in church.

**For the rest of us:**

- Remember that when children are baptized, we promise to do all we can to support their life in Christ. When a child is being a little rambunctious, turn the potential distraction to a reminder to say a quick prayer for them.
- If you find it difficult to hear, move closer to the front of the church. Not only does being closer make it louder, the space under the balcony functions a little like an echo chamber, magnifying the volume of any noise there and blocking the sound from the front of the church.

- Greet children at the peace – it's one of the first parts of the service that young children actively engage in.
- "Adopt" a family or a particular child. Get to know them at coffee hour, and invite them to sit with you. Help them follow the service. Not only will it help them to focus (and therefore be quieter), their relationship with you will be one of the things that keeps them connected to church. I'm still in contact with kids who I first met when they were babies and I was in my twenties – and they are still involved in church.

**SHROVE TUESDAY  
MARDI GRAS CELEBRATION  
TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 28, 6 P.M.**

Mardi Gras is the traditional party of New Orleans the day before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. It will be celebrated by our congregation with a duo of both the old fashioned Shrove Tuesday fare (pancakes and sausage) and HAPPY food with HAPPY cake. We will also process out to the cemetery to “bury the Alleluias” – which will not be resurrected until Easter. Join in with our St. James community of believers before the quiet time of Lent begins. Come in costume, just masks, or JUST COME and bring a dish to share.

**LOOKING AHEAD TO LENT**

Ash Wednesday arrives on March 1<sup>st</sup>. The Rector invites you to join her to hit the streets and welcome St. James to a Holy Lent. For the last few years, a small group of parishioners have offered ashes on Ash Wednesday morning at the St. James railway station from 6 a.m. We are planning to do it again this year! Join us – a sign up sheet will be available in a couple of weeks.

Holy Eucharist will be celebrated later that day at 12 noon and 7:30 p.m. There will be imposition of ashes at both services.

During Lent there will be a service of Holy Eucharist on Tuesday mornings at 9:30 p.m. and a Lenten program on Wednesday evenings. Full details will be available later in the month.

**LENTEN MEDITATIONS**

This Lent we are doing something new! For our daily Lenten meditations, we are planning to put together a booklet of reflections by our own parishioners. Each person will volunteer for a day, will read the readings set for that day, choose a focus, and then prepare a brief reflection on it. Your reflection may be in the form of a short written reflection, a drawing, a photo, or a quote from poetry or a book. Many parishioners have already signed up – please join them! Kids are welcome. There is a sign up sheet with readings in the back of the church on Sunday morning, or you may speak to Raewynne.

## A PASTORAL NOTE
