

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times have we helped out with a wedding, or prayed for a child being baptized, never to see the family again?

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## THE WARDENS' COLUMN

It's interesting how the seasons of the Church correspond liturgically with parish life. The largest season being after Pentecost is also referred to as ordinary time. It is at the end of that season that we conduct our pledge campaign. But stewardship is a year round activity. Advent, a time of preparation, corresponds to the time when we prepare the budget for the coming year. During the Christmas season nominations for the lay leadership are being made. It is a time when we are asked to share the "gifts" that God has given us. The time after the Epiphany and before Lent is also referred to

as ordinary time and is when we have our annual meeting and election of those lay leaders. Often it is in the Easter season that the lay leadership retreats and plans for the mission of the coming year. This brings us back into the ordinary time after Pentecost, in which we look to live out that mission. And the cycle repeats. We think it is important for us to see stewardship as a year round activity. Knowing how our stewardship corresponds liturgically can help us do this.

At this time we, the wardens, find ourselves preparing for another year. However, this time we find it necessary to make a special stewardship appeal to the parish. An appeal not just for your treasure, but for your time and talent as well.

First, we set a financial goal of \$170,000 in pledges for 2013, and that a tithe in giving is the Christian standard. We suggested increasing your pledge by 5% as a means of collectively achieving these goals. At this time we find ourselves ~\$15,000 short of the goal for 2013. As such, we are appealing to the parish as a whole. If you have not pledged support to our church please do so. If you have pledged, we are asking that you consider pledging \$5 more per week. \$5 more per week per family would eliminate the ~\$15,000 budget deficit. It's that simple.

Next, the church needs your commitment of time and talents to further its mission. We know many of us are involved, and some "over" involved. We are sincerely grateful for your dedication. However, we need our entire Christian community to be active in our mission. This will likely mean living outside your comfort zone. We need your commitment to lead, teach, and worship with this parish. New faces and hands are needed and wanted in every aspect of our parish life together, in particular on Vestry,

in our Sunday school, and in our choir. It will likely be a “leap of faith” to make these commitments, but we are sure that God will provide and that your Christian brothers and sisters will gladly walk with you. All we ask is that you please pray on this and listen to where God is calling you.
