RECTOR

One of the things that is most perplexing for people new to the Episcopal Church is the way our denomination is structured. In some ways we are like the

Roman Catholic Church; in other ways we are like Protestant Churches. But we are different from both of them!

Most of these things are determined in our canons, the laws of the church. The basic unit of our denomination is not the parish but the diocese. The diocese is a geographical grouping of local parishes. A diocese will sometimes be an entire state, but most states are broken up into several diocese. Each Diocese elects a Diocesan Bishop from among all priests and the Diocesan Bishop is the overseer of that diocese. The word “episcopas” in Greek simply means “overseer” or bishop.

All of our diocese together make up the Episcopal Church, which itself is part of a larger body called the Anglican Communion, which is a fellowship of nearly 40 national autonomous churches which find their origins in the Church of England. The Archbishop of Canterbury England is the figurative head of this organization, but each

national church rules itself and makes its own policies and procedures.

The Episcopal Church in the United States of America is structured on a national level much like our National Government (and they both came into existence at about the same time). Every three years, Episcopal delegates from across the nation gather in something called the General Convention. This is our national governing body and is composed much like Congress with two “houses”. The House of Bishops is made up of all Bishops and is akin to the Senate. The House of Deputies is made up of both Clergy and Lay People elected from parishes. The number of which is based on population much like the House of Representatives. The Presiding Bishop is elected for a 9 year term from the House of Bishops and presides at the General Convention which meets triennially to establish the canons and policy of the Episcopal Church in America.

As well as national policies, decisions are made at diocesan level by the Diocesan Convention (which meets annually and is made up of clergy and lay representatives of parishes), by Diocesan Council (elected at Convention; it makes decisions in between Conventions) and the Bishop. And while some decisions are up to us as individual parishes (e.g., when we have services, what

our annual calendar will be, what activities we hold), many are determined at the diocesan level.


There is no such thing as an independent Episcopal Parish – to be Episcopalian is to be part of a diocese and under its governance. And Episcopal clergy have to promise to follow the guidance of their bishop when they are ordained.

Each congregation in the diocese, in consultation with their bishop, calls a Rector from among the priests to assist the bishop in its spiritual oversight. The Rector is in charge of all things “spiritual” in a parish, including worship, Christian education, and the use of all facilities for these purposes, and is required to communicate all decisions of the Episcopal Church and of the diocese to the parish. According to the canons, all staff of a parish work for the Rector. The Vestry is in charge of all things “temporal” or secular, such as money, finances, and building upkeep, although the Rector asks for their input on many other matters.

Finally, the canons also talk about the role of all members of the church, everyone who is baptized. The section on ministry begins (Canon 1) by stating that “all baptized persons are called to minister in Christ’s name, to identify their gifts with the help of the Church and to serve Christ’s mission at all times and in all places ... and are called to sustain their ministries through commitment to life-long Christian formation.”

This is probably more than you ever wanted to know, but is helpful as we continue to serve God in this place, and particularly as we approach our annual meeting.

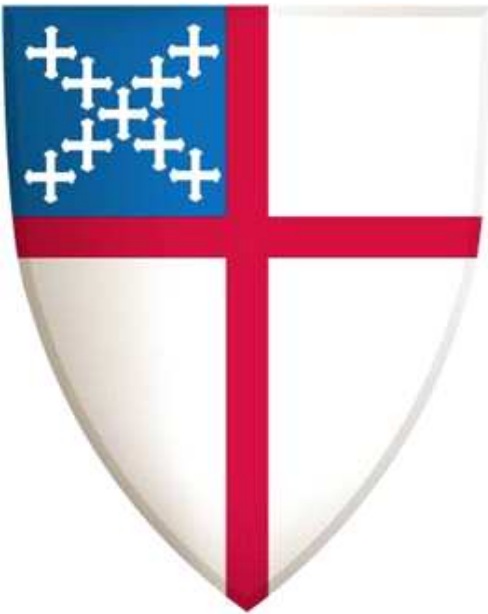
These words of our new Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry, were originally preached at General Convention in 2012. They are now

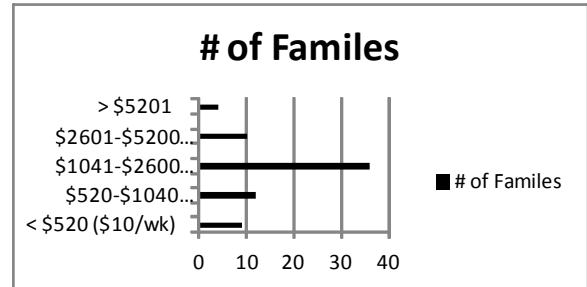
