FROM THE



Over the last week and a half, the Episcopal Church has been meeting in Convention in Salt Lake City. This is one of the major ways that the

Episcopal Church differs from the Roman Catholic Church – major decisions are made not by bishops alone, but by bishops, clergy, and lay representatives together. Each diocese is represented by their bishop(s), four clergy and four laypeople (plus four alternates each for laity and clergy). General Convention meets every three years, at a different site each time. It's one of the largest conventions in the country. While there are about 900 or so participants, the triennial gathering of Episcopal Church women is held concurrently, and a huge range of organizations and businesses also exhibit, from clergy haberdashery to books to organ builders, green power companies, camps, and more! Typically, over 10,000 people are present at some part of Convention. I've heard it described as being like a big family reunion!

Among the major tasks of this General Convention are the election of the new Presiding Bishop, who will hold office for 9 years, approval of the national church

budget, and resolutions to help our church move forward in mission. You can read about the many activities at episcopaldigitalnetwork.org.

The election of Bishop Michael Curry of North Carolina as Presiding Bishop was historic. Not only will he be the first black Presiding Bishop, this is the first time a Presiding Bishop was chosen on the first ballot.

During a video interview after his nomination was announced on May 1, Curry said the "our hand must be on the Gospel plow." "We are followers of Jesus – Jesus of Nazareth – and the truth is we've got a message to proclaim, a life to live and something to share and offer the world", he said. "There's a lot of suffering in this world. There's a lot of heartache, there's a lot of nightmare. We are people who believe that God has a dream and a vision for this world, and that Jesus has shown us how to follow him in the direction of that and how to help this world live into God's dream and vision for us now."

"Our work is actually the work of participating in the Jesus movement, which seeks to realize God's dream and seeks to accomplish God's mission in this world", Curry said.

“The church must help form disciples who will live like Jesus. Such formation must become a priority so that the church is not just creating members, but disciples of Jesus who actually live out and struggle to live out the teachings of Jesus in their lives and make a tangible difference in the world.” If such church wide formation combined with Episcopalians’ individual commitments to imitate Jesus, “we would transform this world.”


“After formation, there’s evangelism and I know sometimes folks are afraid of that word, but I’m not talking about evangelism like other folk do it,” he said. “I am talking about the kind of evangelism that is as much listening as it is sharing.”

Episcopalians must also be willing to “witness in the social sphere, witness in the public sphere, through personal service that helps somebody along the way...prophesying deliverance...(and) being a voice for those who have no voice,” Curry said.

Accepting his election, Curry said The Episcopal Church is “the church where I learned about Jesus.” “This is a good and wonderful church and we are good and wonderful people and I thank God to be one of the b fellowship on the day of the . baptized among you,” Curry said, adding, “my heart is really full.” “We’ve got a society where there are challenges before us and there are crises all around us. And the church has challenges before it,” he said. “We got a God and there really is a Jesus, and we are part of the Jesus Movement. Nothing can stop the movement of God’s love in this world.”

It’s great to be part of a church with such inspiring leadership.

ST. PATRICK

I personally consider the fact that while Bishop of Ireland he helped found several hundred parishes, which in turn built church buildings. Several hundred! Or was it divine intervention and inspiration?

Whatever the reason, it is clear that the lay leadership of St. Patrick was empowered and cared for. In the coming months, in addition to the fall pledge drive, the Stewardship Committee, with the help of Raewynne and the Wardens, will be focusing on the pastoral care and development of our lay leadership. Following the example of the apostles, as found in scripture, our first step will be to make sure all our leaders work in pairs. It is a good model – share the burden and provide support for each other. Yes, it means more people involved and in some cases more work, as “just doing it yourself is easier.” But it was how Jesus commissioned and sent out his disciples, in pairs.

We will be discussing this and working on this in the coming months as a parish. I ask that we all start praying on the idea.
