In just under two weeks, the Episcopal Church will gather in Anaheim for our seventy-sixth General Convention. Every three years, the bishops plus eight deputies from each

diocese — four clergy and four lay people, elected at Diocesan Convention — come together to make decisions for the church. They pray and worship, and they talk about things like the prayer book, music, how to help churches in small communities, relationships with other churches, stewardship, education and almost anything else you can think of that might have something to do with the church. It takes almost two weeks, and just the pre-reading takes up a huge binder.

Among the many items to be discussed are:

- resources for prayers and new liturgies
- programs to help alleviate poverty both within the US and overseas
- continued support for the Millennium Development Goals, crisis and peacemaking efforts in conflict areas such as the Middle East, Sudan, Sri Lanka and the Great Lakes region of Africa
- the proposed Anglican covenant.
- our relationships with other churches and religions
- clergy discipline
- · funding for training for ordained ministry
- sexuality

It is, of course, this last one that will get all the press. But when you hear the press reports, and when people talk to you about what they are hearing, remember a few things:

- Regardless of what is decided, we will gather together, Sunday by Sunday, and worship God as we have always done. Our Sunday School will continue. We will be using the same liturgies, the same hymns, the same prayers. We will baptize in the name of Christ; we will share the body and blood of Christ as we have always done.
- Human sexuality is something the church has struggled with for millennia, and we will no doubt continue to struggle with it. There have always been disagreements, and good arguments on both sides. They focus around things like how do we understand and interpret the bible, what it means to be made in God's image, what is sin, where do grace and justice fit in, can we as the church agree to disagree, where is the line between opinion and heresy.
- These are difficult questions, and there are no easy answers. And they are not just abstract questions we are talking about real people, and they are our brothers, our daughters, our friends, even our clergy.
- We are reminded in scripture that the gospel is for everyone alike; we are all the same from God's point of view. All of us, without Christ, would have no hope of being right with God, without Christ, none of us could know what it is to be forgiven by God, without Christ God would be as far from us, and us as far from God

as we can imagine. But Christ has reconciled us to God, Christ has brought us near, Christ has welcomed us as citizens of heaven and members of the household of God, along with the prophets and apostles and saints. Christ's life and death and resurrection has broken down all the barriers between us and God. That is far more important than the things we disagree on. It means that we choose not to put up barriers between us, that we choose to love one another even when we disagree, that we pray for one another.

* Smithtown Emergency Food Pantry --

St. James parishioners served the pantry during the entire month of June. It was a busy month. The pantry has been cleaned up and a number of our parishioners helped reorganize the shelves. Thank you to Claudette Plaschka and Pat Westlake for their coordination and to all parishioners who served or donated food. The pantry continues to need the usual nonperishable donations of canned meat and fish, stews, pork and beans, hearty soups, peanut butter, jelly, spaghetti sauce, cereal, fruits and vegetables. There is never enough fruit juice. It would help if you would check the cart in the Christian Ed building and transport donations to the pantry.

* Habitat for Humanity of Suffolk -- In

June Ken LeCluse showed a video about Habitat which celebrates their 20 years of work in Suffolk County. To date, 125 homes have been built and this year a community of 24 more homes is planned. Ken will approach Habitat about scheduling our church for a work day. Again this year we are participating in the "Build a Back Pack" program for Habitat homeowners' children. WAYS TO SIMPLIFY YOUR LIFE

- 1. Decide what's most important to you. What do you value most?

- 10. Eat slowly. Slow down to lose weight, improve digestion, and enjoy life more.
- 11. Exercise. It helps burn off stress and makes you feel better.
- 12. Spend time with the people you love.
- 13. Spend time alone. Learn to meditate.
- 14. Slow down. Live life more deliberately.
- 15. Always ask: Will this simplify my life? If the answer is no, reconsider.


LUNCH BUNCH
