Over the last few years, we at St. James have spent a great deal of time trying to work out what our mission and goals are. The

Rector search profile, our mission statement, and our visioning process all resulted in lists of priorities – but for various reasons, we didn't really take those on as a parish and make them reality.

Two weeks ago, the Vestry, Wardens, and Rector spent a weekend on retreat, trying to discern where God is calling us. We studied scripture, reviewed those lists of priorities, and most importantly, prayed. And at the end of two days of hard work, we came up with three areas that we believe God is calling us at St. James to develop. That doesn't mean we'll stop doing things that aren't explicitly mentioned here, just that we will focus particularly on these. As you read them, you will recognize that they are not particularly new. Rather than taking us in a new direction, we are deepening and becoming more intentional about the things that characterize us as a parish community.

Over the coming months, you will see us begin to put these into practice. We hope that every member of our parish will be part

of this process of becoming more and more who God is calling us to be.

Where God is Calling

The Vestry, Wardens and Rector have discerned that God is calling us to the following goals/priorities in the year ahead.

1. Growing in faith with scripture & prayer.
 - a. Bible study: grow to 40 within a year, with "take home."
 - b. 5 alternative style educational activities
 - c. Weekly prayer night (including children)
 - d. Every function/meeting must start with prayer
2. Building relationships in Christ.
 - a. Retreats
 - b. Building relationships by twos
 - c. Social events – intentional focus on meeting one another and our shared faith in Christ
3. Serving one another and the world.
 - a. Volunteering gifts and skills (update database)
 - b. Using the language of service
 - c. Food pantry

WORDS FROM THE WARDENS

Matthew 14: 23: "And when he had sent the multitudes away, he went up into a mountain apart to pray; and when the evening was come, he was there alone."

Luke 9: 28: "And it came to pass about an eight days after these sayings, he took Peter and John and James, and went up into a mountain to pray."

Driving to Trinity Center in West Cornwall, Connecticut takes about three hours. That journey, in which we separate ourselves from our daily responsibilities, is important in any retreat process. As we traveled we shared the ride with fellow Vestry members. The time went quickly as we told stories, laughed, and just got to know each other in a way you can only do when locked in a car trying to leave Long Island on a Friday afternoon.

When we arrived Raewynne had prepared a folder for each of us. Inside the folder, along with the agenda for the weekend, was a card with a photo of St. James parishioners and the following prayer:

Almighty and ever living God, ruler of all things in heaven and earth, hear our prayers for this parish family. Strengthen the faithful, arouse the careless, and restore the penitent. Grant us all things necessary for our common life, and bring us all to be of one heart and mind within your holy Church; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

This set the focus for the weekend. We were on retreat to form a closer relationship with God and our fellow parishioners - those with us and those back at home. We had come together to pray and to seek God's direction. We were there to reflect on the gifts GOD has provided to our parish, and to discern how best to use them.

We began by reflecting our roles as Vestry members. Defining the ministry of the Vestry, we realized that each of us has been called to serve God by taking our place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church. We spent time in a study of the Apostles, and then answered and discussed questions about our role as disciples in the life of the parish of St. James.

Under Raewynne's direction we studied our Mission Statement, goals as identified in the Parish Profile, and our strengths as discerned during the Visioning Process a few years ago. We then reviewed our Baptismal Covenant in comparison to all of the above.

This first morning's session was very intense! In the afternoon we separated, and were given time to reflect and pray on our own; Time to discern where we are being called.

When we gathered again as a group we were refreshed and focused on discerning goals and priorities. What happened next was inspiring. We were of one mind! We did not vote. We did not deliberate. God's will for us just seemed to evolve out of our discussion. It was mutually revealed to us that our mission and ministry at St. James are to:

- Grow in Faith with Scripture and Prayer
- Build Relationships in Christ
- Serve One Another and the World

The rest of our weekend was spent in "Making It Real" and "Taking It Back To The Parish." We believe that these priorities will strengthen the faith and core values of our already strong parish family. We also believe that our very lives are a gift from God and that this gift is to be shared with

others. We look forward to sharing this journey with you.

Suffolk Blood Services received 20 units of blood from St. James parishioners and friends at our Good Friday Blood Drive.

Thank you to all who gave blood, to those who made phone calls, and especially to Edna Rousseau who coordinated the drive. **The Seamen’s Church Institute** will be receiving 8 beautiful handmade scarves and 1 hat from the folks who were knitting and crocheting for Lent. Thank you to all for using your time and your talents to help the men at sea.

The Family Service League of Suffolk has many families that desperately need help. In May, St. James will be adopting Maria, a single mom with five children, and we hope our parishioners will sign up to purchase things the family needs. A Concert to Benefit Haiti is being planned at St. James for June 6. Please put this date on your calendar.

The Smithtown Emergency Food Pantry will be needing extra food for the summer, when kids are out of school and home for lunch. Our month to staff the pantry is August. It would be a real learning experience for our older St. James kids to help at the pantry. Right now foods needed include juice, baked beans, canned meat dinners, jelly, and canned fruits. If you can take a turn transporting the food from the church to the pantry, it would be appreciated.

The St. James Strawberry Festival & Yard Sale is planned for June 12. Some of the profits from this is used as outreach money. As you pack boxes to give to the church for the yard sale, please remember clean items in good shape will bring in more money. It saves many people work if you will wash dirty items at home before bringing them to church. There seems to be some confusion about what belongs at the Yard Sale in June and what the Gold

Elephant table is looking for at the Harvest Festival in October. If you have a special item, such as a new unused gift, or an antique, near antique or collectible, and it has no chips, cracks, or missing pieces, save it at your house until fall for the Gold Elephant table. The Gold Elephant table will charge more for these items than the yard sale can. Gold Elephant, however, does not want run-of-the-mill yard sale items. Spring is the time to donate them.

LET'S HELP MARIA & HER FAMILY IN NEED

Again this year, St. James Church will be sponsoring a family through the Family Service League of Long Island. It is our hope that every parishioner will sign up to donate one item to help Maria's family. **Maria** is a single mother raising five children on her unemployment and with help from Social Services. She also accesses services such as food pantries to make ends meet. Her oldest daughter, **Christina**, lives at home and works part time. She is 18 and pregnant, due in May. Maria has another daughter, 17-year-old **Alicia**, who will be graduating from high school this year; twin 14-year-old boys, **Eric** and **Kevin**; and a 5-year-old son, **Anthony**. Since Maria has been a single mother for many years, she is used to living on a tight budget. But with one daughter expecting, another graduating from high school, and two teenage boys, finances are tighter than they have been in years.

THANK YOU FOR SUPPORTING PROTESTANT CAMPUS MINISTRY AT STONY BROOK UNIVERSITY

We wish every church which supports Protestant Campus Ministry could have been at our meeting recently to hear Chaplain Brenda's report.

You may have read about a recent tragedy in Queens where a mother and her two daughters were murdered by the father, who then killed himself. The older daughter was a student at Stony Brook University, home for the weekend.

Chaplain Brenda told of arriving at her office late in the afternoon to find a dozen or more students, friends of the victim, Yanique Bailey, waiting to see her. Our Campus Minister spent hours, praying with the students, listening to them talk about their friend, sharing their grief, grappling with questions of faith, looking at their own relationships with their parents. Chaplain Brenda helped one student call home to talk with her own father, and talked with others who had information that might be helpful to the police. Scores of students sought her counsel and comfort. She remained on campus as long as she was needed, then stayed overnight in a nearby motel so she could be available again early the next morning. When some of Yanique's friends wanted to remember their fellow student in a public way, it was to Chaplain Brenda that they turned, and she helped them to plan and carry out an on-campus vigil. Later, she prepared the friends for the funeral service to be held in Queens. With the help of other clergy at the Interfaith Center and counselors available through the University, the work of healing and making whole continues.

We were moved beyond words in appreciation of all our Campus Minister was able to do, and we thank God for your

support of Protestant Campus Ministry which enabled this to happen.
