How much do you know about our faith? America is one of the most religious nations on earth, but we're not so good when it comes to basic questions about our faith.

Today, the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life released the results of a survey that tested respondents on thirty-two questions on knowledge of the Bible, world religions and what the Constitution says about religion in public life.

People only got an average of sixteen right. That's a bare pass, at best. And mainline Protestants (that includes us Episcopalians) didn't even do that well.

Now, part of the reason for this is that they weren't just asked about their own faith. It's understandable if Christians don't know what religion Maimonides was (Jewish) or the Dalai Lama (Buddhist). Likewise, we might not expect Muslims to know the names of the gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John), or who was a key figure in the Great Awakening (Jonathan Edwards). But Mormons scored best on questions on Christianity, and atheists and agnostics scored best overall. And every faith category – from Jews to Mormons – did poorly in

giving correct answers to questions they should know about their declared faith. Christians had problems with questions about what religion Mother Teresa was (Catholic), what Catholic beliefs about the Eucharist are (the bread and wine become the body and blood of Christ), and whether the golden rule is one of the Ten Commandments (no).


And then there are the Constitutional issues. Teachers in public schools are not, of course, allowed to lead their class in prayer; they can, however, read the bible as an example of great literature, and teach a class on comparative religion.

We all know that surveys aren't perfect, and you don't want to read too much into them. But it does give one pause for thought. Why is it that as American Christians, we don't know a whole lot about our faith?

One of the areas the vestry believes that God is calling us to, is to grow in faith in scripture and prayer. Part of that growing is to learn what we believe. And it's not hard. All we have to do is get out our bibles, and begin to read (the gospels are a good place to start). Join a bible study. Open the Book of Common Prayer and read the Catechism (near the end) - or ask one of this year's confirmation candidates what the highlights are!

Most of us are not likely to be included in a Pew survey of religion. But we have friends, family, work colleagues and acquaintances who are searching for meaning in their lives, and might just find that meaning in Christ - as long as we know what to tell them!

This is precisely the good news of the Gospel. While it is not a secret, it certainly can be mysterious. But when we share the Gospel of Christ with others, and live it out, we often find ourselves being surprised in a very good way, and living in the Kingdom of God.

BUSY season of the start of our Church's program year. We have already held our Ministry Fair, enjoyed the annual Pig Roast, and started Sunday School. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION & FORMATION Join Us in Bible Study!

In late September, three Bible Study groups reconvened for a 10-week study of I and II Timothy and Titus - books commonly known as the "pastoral letters" since they are written to an individual, rather than to a gathered church community. As we have shared our questions and discoveries, and as we have been challenged to think about the relevance of our faith for our daily lives, we have encouraged each other in prayer and presence, with new friendships growing out of these spiritual conversations.
