RECTOR

One of the things you notice when you read the psalms is how often they focus on praise and thanksgiving to God. But they are not the only way we praise

God: a major expression of praise is our hymns.

This fall, I've taken over choosing our hymns (formerly, the music director did it), and I thought you might find it helpful to know how I go about that.

## Readings for the day

I begin by looking at the lectionary readings for the day. Many hymns quote or explicitly refer to scripture. Hymn 377, "All people that on earth do dwell", is a paraphrase of Psalm 100. Hymn 437, "Tell out my soul", is a paraphrase of the Magnificat, the song of Mary, from the gospel of Luke. Hymn 552, "Fight the good fight", draws on 2 Timothy 4.

## Liturgical season

Some hymns do not relate specifically to an individual text, but to the themes of a whole season. So in Advent we sing hymns about keeping watch, and in Lent we sing about repentance. There are sections in our

hymnals for many different seasons and festivals of the church year, as well as different occasions such as baptism, marriage, and funerals. So I look to see whether there are any seasonal hymns appropriate for the week.

## Position in the service

The Eucharist has a particular flow to it, and the hymns help that flow. We begin with an invitation to worship. So the first hymn will often be a hymn of praise, or will introduce the theme for the day (e.g., the liturgical season). The Gradual hymn, situated in the midst of God's word read from Scripture, will typically relate to one of the readings, or be about God's word to us. During the Offertory, we tend to sing in thanksgiving for God's blessing, or in offering to God. Our Communion hymn is usually reflective in tone, and may focus on Christ's gift of himself to us and our offering ourselves in return. The closing hymn sends us back out into our daily lives, so is often focused on our Christian pilgrimage and response to God. So I need a range of hymns to fit in all these places.


## Practical concerns

The Offertory hymn needs to be long enough for the ushers to collect the offertory; the closing hymn needs to be long enough to get the acolytes, choir, eucharistic ministers and clergy out the door!

Hymns need to be singable. A hymn might be absolutely perfect for the readings and the theme of the day, and a particular position in the service, but the setting just might be too difficult for our congregation to sing. Sometimes I can find another tune that fits the meter of the words; other times I just have to abandon that hymn as an option. Finally, we don't want to sing the same half dozen hymns all the time, so I keep track of when we sing hymns, and try not to sing any one hymn more often than once every three months or so.

So to choose the hymns for any given Sunday, I start by making a list of hymns that relate to the lectionary readings set for that day, and any seasonal hymns. I evaluate them for singability, and check to see if we have sung any of them recently. I then begin to allocate them to places in the service. If there are any gaps, I look for more general hymns that might fit the flow of the service. Hopefully, at the end of it all, we have a selection of hymns that will help us all to worship God.

## THE WARDENS' COLUMN

*We do take on the appearance of our thoughts, our desires, our actions. Remember what Solomon said: "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." (Proverbs 23:7)*

When you read this the Harvest Festival, Feast of St. Francis/Blessing of the Animals and St. James Day will be at our doorstep. Confirmation at the Cathedral, Halloween, and All Saints Day will be on the near horizon. It all comes and goes so quickly. Quite often in the busyness of our lives we become overwhelmed and are "beside ourselves" with emotion: frustration, dismay, fear; hope, joy, gratitude. Whatever we are feeling it is often difficult to explain why.

It is exactly when we are "beside ourselves" that we can faithfully turn to scripture and Jesus Christ to find our way in them. On Sunday September 27<sup>th</sup> those of us in church were fortunate to hear an extraordinary sermon from a visiting deacon and former homiletics student of Raewynne's, Anthony Jones. A good preacher has a way of connecting the word of God to our current existence. Through the grace of God they seem to be speaking directly to us individually. He spoke about the community of church and how as Christians it matters how we feel and that we support one another.

Our mission and many ministries and endeavors here at St. James require some effort, a little sweat equity, and lots of prayer. "It Takes a Village". Whatever your opinion of Hilary Clinton is, the message in her book is so universally true that it often seems trite: Individually we can do only so much, collectively we can move mountains. Sometimes we hesitate thinking we can contribute so little, so why embarrass

ourselves by the meagerness of our gift. Yet each gift of time, or talent, or devotion is magnified so many times over. The gift may seem small to you, yet the rebounding gratitude is enormous.

Setting up the Book Nook, Gold Elephant tables, the jam and baked goods displays may seem like an overwhelming task. But your contribution needn't be more than giving earrings you have lost interest in, or a plate of brownies or corn bread. Or perhaps you could serve a brother or sister in Christ for an hour by giving them a lunch break.

This is the kind of painless giving that brings life to a community. It gives energy to all those involved. It feeds a need for communion with like minded people whose journey toward God is ongoing. And who knows, while in community you might find someone who knows a great babysitter, or a podiatrist down the street who is "wonderful." These are opportunities to meet a "fellow poet" or a "kindred soul."

Random acts of kindness and giving in our parish extend to our community, and our larger world. They teach us the glory of giving and receiving, of thanksgiving and gratitude. They bring us closer to God's grace.

Deacon Jones finished his sermon with the poem, "It Shows in Your Face". It is a poem his great aunt shared with him as a boy. The last stanza reads:

*"If your life is selfless, if for others you live,  
For not what you get, but how much you can  
give;  
If you live close to God in his infinite grace-  
You don't have to tell it, it shows in your  
face."*

## OUTREACH

### **Chaplain Brenda Ford at Protestant Campus Ministry at Stony Brook University has been very busy this fall with services and programs for students.**

She is a wonderful role model for all. A number of her students have graduated and moved away; other graduates are helping her with undergraduate events. Father Farrell Graves, from All Souls Episcopal Church in Stony Brook and Caroline Church, is also assisting her with services and programs. St. James has contributed some extra funds this year, due to a budget surplus from 2014. Money continues to be "touch and go" for this ministry, despite the generosity of several local churches like ours and many individuals. Students are once again collecting toiletries that they package for those in need. Our collection basket for toiletries is in the narthex. Please pray for Chaplain Brenda, her students, and for PCM.

**We hope for a Habitat for Humanity work day this fall.** Please let Ken LeCluse know if you would like to participate. We have money yet in our outreach budget which Ken would like to hand to Habitat when we have our work day.

**The Outreach Committee held a meeting in Spring 2015.** Decisions were made for the gifts below:

+ There was a surplus of \$1,500.00 in the 2014 church budget that was allocated for outreach - \$1,000.00 has been sent to PCM.; \$500.00 will be given to Habitat when we have a work day this fall (or sent to them by the end of 2015).

+ There is \$4,000.00 in the 2015 church budget for outreach:

\$2,500.00 has been sent to PCM

\$250.00 has been sent to the Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society in Jerusalem

\$250.00 has been sent to Episcopal Relief & Development to be used for Haiti

\$250.00 (held for an emergency) is being sent to the Diocese of LI for the Refugee Ministry

\$500.00 will be given to Habitat (along with the \$500.00 above from 2014) on our work day, or will be sent to them by the end of 2015.

\$250.00 will be sent to Bread for the World this fall.

**Budget Summary:** The only remaining outreach money to be paid out this year is \$1,000.00 for Habitat and \$250.00 for Bread for the World.
