FROM THE



RECTOR

One of the gifts of travel is seeing how other people live, and as Christians, seeing how they live out their faith.

While I was in Australia, I

worshipped with a number of different churches.

A little context: Australia is a religiously diverse country and has no official religion. Christianity is the predominant faith – about 65 percent of the population, but over 22 percent state that they have no religion, an increase of almost 4 percent in 5 years. Although the churches run many schools and hospitals, and most children are taught about religion at school, only about 7.5 per cent actually attend church.

Ferntree Gully Anglican Church is a small, outer suburban church, in an area not unlike Nesconset or Lake Grove. I went to the 8 a.m. service (followed by tea and scones), which had mostly older members, and a couple of families. They have few facilities – just a church and multipurpose foyer, but have a major ministry at the local hospital, sharing their priest as a chaplain there.

Open Door church in Monbulk, a town on

the outskirts of Melbourne, was formed when two local churches (Uniting - a denomination that draws together Presbyterians, Methodists, and Congregationalists - and Churches of Christ) combined and moved their location into town. Their primary ministry is a thrift store in town, which also offers a food pantry, financial counseling, mentoring of school children, and other supportive services. They are small, but have a wide range of members!


Taree Anglican is a big building in a largish country town. It's Anglo-Catholic in style, and has mostly older members, though there was an extended family present for a baptism the day I was there. They have a good choir, and look pretty much like an average church here in the U.S. – but are part of a group of four or so churches, sharing a rector, two non-stipendiary clergy, and a young assistant who is also chaplain to a local Anglican school. Every child baptized there is given a hand knitted teddy bear, and then once a year all are invited for the annual “teddy bears’ picnic”!

Tinonee Anglican is a little church in a tiny town about 15 miles from Taree. It shares a priest with another slightly larger nearby town. My mother is one of the youngest members! They are faithful members who pitch in together to clean the church, play

the organ, cook for coffee hour, and care for one another.

Each of these churches is faithfully carrying out their witness to Christ in an increasingly disinterested culture. They have learned to do more with less, and continue to share their love of Christ with the communities around them.

And all this raises the question for us in the U.S.A., where the role of religion in our culture is heading in the same direction as Australia. What are the essentials of our life together? What are the things we can let go of, in order to more fully witness Christ?

Reflection upon this unique tradition evokes warm memories of folks like Ginger and Bill Tuttle, the Toops, the Tebbuts and the Batallers, plus unforgettable images such as Dan Maybee in his Pig Pith Helmet or of Willie Rasmussen guarding the pig late in the day so that Art Gureck, Ernie Harders, Chris Sequino, Ken LeCluse, Hank Hull, and Bob Moleti could rush home to change clothes after many hours of transporting, seasoning and turning the pig in the giant oven built especially for the event. While the men were busy preparing the pig, Arlyne, Louise, Anita, Ruth, Eileen, and Lillian were usually in the kitchen producing

mountains of coleslaw, gallons of baked beans, and tons of potato salad. Other dedicated regulars were always on hand to set up and serve. Tables and chairs were originally, and for many subsequent pig roasts, set up right outside on the grass. Finally after an entire day of vigilance, and careful basting, the pig was ceremoniously presented for all to enjoy a succulent feast of pork and fresh homemade side dishes. It happened every fall just like that. The atmosphere of the pig roast was relaxed and informal; an evening of fun and fellowship. We are so grateful for the core group of parishioners who worked so hard to make it happen year after year, and we invite them to sit back and enjoy what Bruce Lawrence and David Douglass have volunteered to do: a Texas Barbeque!

FOLLOWING JESUS IN DAILY LIFE SUMMER BIBLE STUDY SUMMARY

During four evening sessions in July and August, a dozen parishioners participated in a thought-provoking study that grew from Raewynne's June 2 sermon about the “grounding” principles that guide our daily lives as we seek to follow Jesus. Do we take our cue from popular assumptions about Christianity? Or does Scripture give us a different picture? After studying numerous biblical passages and reviewing the key points of our faith as expressed in the Catechism (see Book of Common Prayer, 845-862), we drafted the following five tenets that present a biblical framework for daily life and thought. Contrast these with the popular statements that can be referred to as Moralistic Therapeutic Deism, found at the end of this entry.

Statements about Biblical Christianity

(from the Summer Bible Study participants)

1. The Triune God created the universe, and in him all things are held together. God has revealed himself to us through creation, the prophets, and through his son Jesus.

2. God calls us to follow Jesus, whose life and teachings are recorded in the Bible and who guides us through the Holy Spirit to help bring about and live into his kingdom on earth.

3. The central goal of life is to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength and to love our neighbor as ourselves.

4. God wants to be intimately involved in our lives and desires that we will live in harmony with him, with each other, with ourselves, and with creation. He gives us the freedom to make this choice.

5. Only God is good. By acknowledging our own sinfulness and choosing to follow Christ, we die to ourselves, are reborn, and have the assurance that nothing will separate us from the love of God, in death or in life.

Contrasted with statements within Moralistic Therapeutic Deism (Popular Belief)

1. A God exists who created and ordered the world and watches over human life on earth.

2. God wants people to be good, nice, and fair to each other, as taught in the Bible and by most world religions.

3. The central goal of life is to be happy and to feel good about oneself.

4. God does not need to be particularly involved in one's life except when God is needed to resolve a problem.

5. Good people go to heaven when they die.

“The transition back to the States has been bizarre and more difficult than I expected. I often find *lo siento* or *perdón* popping out of my mouth when I bump into people in the airport, cafeteria, or shopping mall...

In retrospect, I realize that although I learned treasured lessons this summer, I return to

America with more questions than answers. I have seen the emotional and psychological effects of poverty. I have experienced the global church (well, another part of it, at least), I have furthered my awareness of just how BIG our God is, and I have discovered the discomfort and wonderment of other-culture-immersion. I come back to America with different eyes, and yet it is hard to identify what exactly has changed. I have unexpectedly grown to love our country more, but I simultaneously grapple with the reality of having so much, we complain far too often...

Ironically though, my experience in Guatemala has prepared me for the difficulties of returning home. The Lord consistently taught me the importance of leaning on Him above my understanding. He tangibly showed me that faith is being certain of what we **do not see**. God didn't promise me understanding. He didn't promise me sight, at least on earth. But he asks me to have faith and trust in him, even when things don't make sense. I have learned to 'just go with it' in ways I never seemed able before; so as I walk into my senior year at Wheaton, although some things are dreadfully unclear, I know I can trust my trustworthy Dad, Savior, Lord and King."
