FROM THE



A couple of weeks ago, I was watching daytime TV on my day off, when they began talking about recommendations for Christmas gifts.

There were some great ideas, and, of course, some not so great. But the line that caught my attention was this: “Bring some spiritually back into Christmas with a Buddha.” Now, I don’t have anything against Buddhism, but it seems to me there is a more obvious spiritual figure associated with Christmas – yes, Jesus.

This time of the year, we begin to see signs springing up, “Put the Christ back into Christmas,” or “Jesus is the reason for the season” They express what many of us feel, that sometimes the religious (and original) meaning of Christmas gets overshadowed by shopping, Santa, and decorations. We want to remind people that it’s Christ’s birth that we are celebrating!

But I suspect that the most effective way to encourage people to celebrate Christ’s birth is not with signs and slogans (though you may have seen the great ad for the Episcopal Church in USA Today last week – it’s printed later in *Open Doors*), but an invitation for them to join us. Personally. As in, “We have a great Christmas service at

my church; I was wondering if you’d be interested in coming with me?”

Yes, it’s difficult to invite someone to church. You risk being rejected; you risk offending them. But think how much harder it must be, if you don’t have a church home, or perhaps even any church background, just to walk in by yourself. Recently, on an Episcopalian message board on a knitting website, someone wrote this: “I have a 6 year old daughter and I’d like to take her to church, and I’d like to take myself to church too ... but I’m nervous about the whole thing, how to prepare her, how to go about it in general. Can anybody give me some reassurance and basic instructions for kind of literally how to take my daughter and go to church on a Sunday?” Thankfully, a bunch of people responded to her. But what if she hadn’t had anyone to ask? She probably would still be wondering.

So, consider inviting someone to church with you this Christmas. Our first service Christmas Eve will be the family-oriented service at 5:30 p.m., with impromptu Christmas pageant (any child who shows up is invited to participate as a shepherd or angel – we have some costumes available or they can wear their own). That’s followed at 9:00 p.m. by “Silent Night at St. James,” a traditional candlelit celebration Eucharist with choir, followed by drinks at the Rectory. On Christmas morning, we celebrate with a small, but joyful, Eucharist at 10:00 a.m. Then, on December 27, the

Sunday after Christmas, both our morning services will be Lessons and Carols (with Eucharist). And, finally, we round out the Christmas season on January 3 with a celebration of the Feast of the Epiphany with Baptisms, and followed by our annual Epiphany Brunch.

Looking forward to celebrating Christ's birth with you and your families and friends!

ADVENT EVENING OF REFLECTION

So begin the first two verses of the well-known Advent hymn. Each of "*The Great O Antiphons*" shaping each verse is a brief prayer addressing Christ by one of his messianic titles from the Old Testament and ending with a heartfelt plea for his coming. Although the precise origin of these texts is unknown, by the 8th and 9th centuries the church in Rome and monastic communities throughout western Europe were using these words at evening worship services during the season of Advent. Enjoy a reflective respite with the Christian Formation and Education Committee as we look more closely at this popular hymn.

2009 ADVENT BOOKLETS

STEWARDSHIP

I wanted to submit a personal testimony regarding pledging, as I'm so excited (really I am) to be able to submit a pledge card for 2010.

Pledging for 2010: My personal situation has brought me to a time of permanent disability. I haven't worked for Child Protective Services since 10/13/06. However, I've been extraordinarily blessed to have a supportive family, who were able to carry my financial needs. I was very disappointed to not be able to make a pledge for 2009, as I had no income of my own. This past summer I received notification that I now qualify for permanent Social Security Disability. Now that I am receiving a small income, I have the opportunity to start at the foundation and make a tithe presented to God through my church. I really am very excited to return to a minimum tithing of 10% back to God. After all, He gives and provides for 100% of our needs.

I have preciously experienced the power and benefits of tithing. While I don't seek the benefit, I know that tithing works. When I first finished my B.A. degree, I earned about \$7,000 that year, and tithed, and I also saved \$2,000 that year for a downpayment on a car. With tithing I experience financial freedom and have experienced this freedom seep into other areas of my life. Although it bewilders my mind as to how financial ends can be met and stretched, it also brings a sense of wonderment and awe at God's magnificence.
