One of the huge differences when I moved to the U.S. from Australia was Advent. In Australia it's well and truly

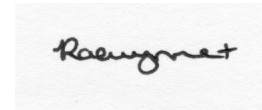

## THE WARDENS' COLUMN

### Advent

In one sense Advent is such a rich time of anticipation and promise. We busily plan our days, our gatherings, our purchases. We decorate and listen to joyful music. But in another sense we feel burdened, even if those burdens are of our own making. There is a weight dragging at us.

This year there is an even greater sense of heaviness. The post election mood, whether we are jubilant in victory or stunned by loss, presents us as individuals and as a nation with one very clear truth: we are a country deeply divided. Naturally, with only two major political parties, there is always a divide. But this divide we have within us is as dramatic and mind bending as they come.

The Convention last month focused on "Racial Justice and Reconciliation". A worth and compelling theme brought to life vividly throughout the Convention. But the chasm facing us is even broader, deeper, more diverse. It is economic, social, educational. It encompasses race, gender, ethnicity, belief. It speaks to the loss of power and authority. There are so many who feel their voices are no longer heard, their vote no longer counts.

So how does one cross the divide and begin the healing process? When our bishop was asked if he had "come to make more trouble" or to help, it raised the question for him of how our message, as disciples of Christ, had gone so terribly wrong. Here he was a man of the cloth, there to support and console, and yet taken for a trouble maker, not a healer.

And it raises the question in our own community – how is our church, our faith, perceived by our neighbors? As we cast

about for hope in a time of vehement protest and profound insecurity, we need to think about what we can do to make things better. As with most problem solving, the first step is the hardest.

Here at St. James, and in all our parishes island-wide, we have been asked by our bishop to exercise our faith, to spread the Word, to open our arms not only to our friends but also to strangers. "Acts of kindness" take on a life of their own. We can engage a parishioner we have not spoken to before. We can invite an acquaintance to Christmas Eve services. Give a small bouquet or fresh baked cookies to a neighbor who seldom gets out of the house. Carry around a couple of extra toys in the trunk of the car, just in case. Or call someone who is newly bereaved with words of comfort. The size of the gift hardly matters. The giving is everything.

As we approach the light of that miraculous star guiding all to Bethlehem, let us bring together all who are in the shadows and share the beauty of that light.

reaching out our hand in love,  
may bring those who do not know you  
to the knowledge and love of you.
