RECTOR

On the front of our bulletin every week is a drawing of the church building, surrounded by the three ways in which we believe God is calling us as a parish:

growing in faith through scripture and prayer, building relationships in Christ, and serving one another and the world. These are not so much goals as our vocation, our calling here at St. James.

Another way of thinking about this, is that these three things express God's dream for us – to be a community of disciples of Christ who are steeped in prayer and scripture, a community characterized by strong and caring relationships which reflect God's love made incarnate in Christ, a community which expresses its faith through service that responds to Christ's call to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, visit the sick and prisoners, and lead others to experience God's reconciling love.

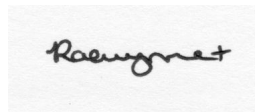
As we enter pledge season, it's easy to focus on raising money to pay our expenses as a church. But while a balanced budget might be the *outcome* of our pledge drive, it's not the *purpose* of this season. The purpose is to help us reflect on how God has blessed us

and how we will respond to that blessing, how God has called us and how we will respond to that call. And at the heart of it all is God's dream. When we pledge, we choose to be part of God's dream for St. James.

Once we have pledges for 2014 in hand, we will begin to develop our budget. Our pattern has been to start with our previous year's budget and work from there. But I've begun to wonder, what would it look like to start with God's dream for us? If money were no object, what might we do? (And I'm sure you could add many more ideas!)

- * *Hire a Christian educator to help grow the faith of our children and youth?*
- * *Replace some of our aging vestments to add to the beauty of our worship?*
- * *Employ a parish nurse to assist our older parishioners as they face the complexities of aging?*
- * *Buy a bus to bring college students to church?*
- * *Host a series of events to help us get to know each other better?*
- * *Build a house with Habitat?*
- * *Buy new hymnals to expand our range of music?*
- * *Get bibles for the pews?*
- * *Expand the work of the food pantry?*
- * *Renovate our buildings to allow more community use?*

How will you – and the pledge you make this year – be part of God’s dream for St. James in 2014?



THE WARDEN’S COLUMN

May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight, LORD, my Rock and my Redeemer.

Psalms 19:14

I am at a loss on how to hold your attention as I share some thoughts on stewardship and our fall pledge drive. I fear that these are two topics that we sometimes tune out. And yet, the concept of stewardship is central to our Christian lives, and our pledges are what enable us to do the mission of Jesus Christ here and now. So I pray by the grace of God you read further.

Why do we give? A good gift is an expression of love. When we give out of love, we don’t give to get back. Pledging should be like giving a gift or throwing a party for someone you love. You always give the best with the money available. You usually overspend and it turns out great and yet you find you’re not broke.

Who do we give to? It is human nature to want to be in control. Life gets a lot easier when you realize God is in control and he wants to save us. Not being in control is about having faith. When we give to charity, we want to give it to the “best” charity. We want to feel in control that “my” money is being put to good use. When we give to the church we are literally giving back to God, and we should have faith that the “body of Christ” will put it to good use.

How much do we give? God has given abundantly to us. According to a Parable, the good steward returns two fold on what is entrusted to him. Are we hoarding or squandering our gifts when we don’t give back abundantly? This is not just true of money but also of our time and talents.

What do miracles look like? Currently we

have ~70 families that pledge ~\$150,000 in support of the ministries at St. James. Recent statistics list the average household income for Suffolk Co. as ~\$90,000. Is the concept of the tithe (10%) as the standard of Christian giving asking for a miracle? Hypothetically speaking, if our 70 families tithed, St. James would have ~\$630,000 for support of ministries. What would we do with it? Over ten years that would generate about \$4,600,000 for outreach. Even if in that time we came up short and only reached an average giving level of 5% of our income it would generate \$2,300,000. Ask yourself who would we help? It would certainly be a miracle in the lives of those we did help. Now ask yourself, would it really take a miracle?

The Pantry is open Monday - Friday from 9 a.m. to Noon.

Protestant Campus Ministry students at Stony Brook University are collecting toiletries to benefit women transitioning from domestic violence situations and pregnant teens at a home for unwed mothers.
