He's doing as well as can be expected, and is an inspiration in the way he is dealing with it. In between bouts of nausea, my brother takes him to the park. John wrote this recently: "He has taken to stopping at the large Victorian drinking fountain that is in the middle of one of the main paths. The spires remind him of church, because without fail he climbs up, puts his hands in the bowl and prays - Thank you God for making me better, and thank you for making all the other sick children better too." Thank you all for your prayers during this time.

Back here in the U.S. there is a new coolness in the air, and what leaves were not stripped by the hurricane are beginning to change color. Fall is

just around the corner, and it's time to begin a new program year at the church.

Kick-off Sunday will be September 18! It's always a great celebration with everyone back after the summer. We'll have a ministry fair at Coffee Hour, along with registration for our new children's program, "Godly Play" (i.e., Sunday school). Come, reconnect, explore what we have to offer. ## A WORD FROM THE WARDENS

This is the scripture reading that Debbie did at her brother-in-law Tom's Memorial Service. Thomas J. Farino, Capt., Engine 26 FDNY, was killed when the South Tower fell on September 11, 2001. We think the reading is fitting on so many levels. Not only as we remember the events of that day ten years ago, but as we also persevere through the trials of our daily lives, the recent storm, and these uncertain economic times. This is clear evidence that Holy Scripture is alive, and God speaks to us through it.

### The Holy Spirit is here to help you.

*"I am sure that what we are suffering now cannot compare with the glory that will be shown to us. In fact, all creation is eagerly waiting for God to show who his children are. Meanwhile, creation is confused, but not because it wants to be confused. God made it this way in the hope that creation would be set free from decay and would share in the glorious freedom of his children. We know that all creation is still groaning and is in pain, like a woman about to give birth.*

*The Spirit makes us sure about what we will be in the future. But now we groan silently, while we wait for God to show that we are his children. This means that our bodies will also be free. And this hope is what saves us. But if we already have what we hope for, there is no need to keep on hoping. However, we hope for something we have not yet seen, and we wait patiently for it.*

*In certain ways we are weak, but the Spirit is here to help us. For example, when we don't know what to pray for, the Spirit prays for us in ways that cannot be put into words. All of our thoughts are known to God. He can understand what is in the mind of the*

*Spirit, as the Spirit prays for God's people. We know that God is always at work for the good of everyone who loves him. They are the ones God has chosen for his purpose, and he has always known who his chosen ones would be. He had decided to let them become like his own Son, so that his Son would be the first of many children. God then accepted the people he had already decided to choose, and he has shared his glory with them." (Romans 8:18-30)*

Bible study has made me part of a small group that has developed enough trust that we can speak about things that seemed too personal in the past. And I like pausing right in the middle of a typically crazy week to pray with friends and remind myself what's truly important.

On a Cursillo weekend, one of the many talks you hear over the course of the three days is entitled "Study." I have heard the talk given many times by many different lay people, first on my weekend, and then, subsequently, when I served as a team member. In the Cursillo "method," (a recipe for living a balanced, faithful life in Christ), study is compared to a leg of a stool or

tripod. The other two legs are Piety and Apostolic Action.

In the past eleven years since I made my Cursillo weekend in 2000, I have always admitted to myself and to others that my weak leg is Study. But God does, indeed, have a sense of humor, and somewhat to my amazement, I find myself leading a beginner's Bible Study at St. James. It has been a stretch for me to do my "homework" each week, so I'm prepared to jump into whatever chapter of the New Testament we've been reading. I have ordered study guides, and done research on the internet. It has certainly cured me of thinking of my Study leg as unsteady, and I definitely am less intimidated by reading Scripture.

Our Wednesday evening group is a diverse group of women and one gentleman. We are all (except for Raewynne) beginners, and we enjoy lively discussions, questions and answers, and helping each other to have a fuller and more in-depth understanding of God's Holy Word.

Nearly 30 years ago as a new bride, I stepped into my first adult Bible study. The group met weekly in the home of a couple a few years older than us. It was a huge step for me—both to be in someone's home to study the Bible on a regular basis and to be part of sometimes unnerving discussions that went past providing the "right" answer. Learning to wrestle with passages of Scripture and then to "dwell" in them from week to week became deeply imbedded into the pattern of my life. Making the commitment to a weekly study group does require intentionality and priority-setting, but it is an irreplaceable means of opening ourselves to God's voice, to the perspective of others, and to growing together as a community of God's people.

For years I told myself that Bible Study was just not for me. I actually was intrigued but figured that I was just too uneducated to be there with people who read the Bible on a regular basis and actually understood it! Sounds silly really because of course the Bible is at the core of our worship. But I know I am not alone in the way I felt. Finally, I took the plunge and started attending the Wednesday night *Beginner Bible Study*. I found myself with a group of (mainly) women who were very much like me! I found that the Bible is not nearly as intimidating as it seems, and I really love being with a group who have questions and opinions to share. And on the rare occasions when I have been with people who have been studying for years, I had the wonderful discovery that they didn't think I was stupid or uneducated. We all have a relationship with God that we can more fully explore through Bible Study. ALL of us have something to offer that is of value to others, even if it is just being the person asking questions.

Bible Study has been a gift to me because it

has not only given me a much deeper understanding of my faith, but it has opened my eyes and heart to the wonderful thoughts and ideas of my fellow students of all generations.

## **GODLY PLAY**

This Fall we are moving to a new style of formation for our children. Faced with a struggling Sunday school, the wardens, Sunday school director, and others from our parish who are passionate about children, met to talk about what we should do. We realized that while we had tended to say, “What do we do about Sunday school?” our real question was “How do we raise our children with faith?”

As we explored answers to that question, it became clear to us that the Godly Play program provided what we were looking for. It is a highly-structured Montessori-influenced program in which children experience the biblical stories and are invited to respond. We ran two demonstration workshops, and it was clear that our children responded incredibly positively to this way of growing in faith. We now have six people willing to teach the program, and continue to look for others so that we can have an ongoing rotation of teachers. It will still happen in the same time slot: the children will leave immediately following Communion, and be in class for 30 - 45 minutes. Classes will begin on 9/25.

Below is a description of the program from the Godly Play website:

What is GODLY PLAY? Godly Play is a method of Christian education and spiritual direction primarily for children ages 2 -12.

The goal of Godly Play is to teach children the art of using religious language – parable, sacred story, silence, and liturgical action – to help them become more fully aware of God’s presence in their lives.

When Christian language is learned by the Godly Play approach, it is learned as a means to know God and to make meaning in our lives. This approach is quite different from the traditional model in which the teacher tells the children what they need to know. Godly Play is not about things that are that simple. It is not just about learning lessons or keeping children entertained. It is about locating each lesson in the whole system of Christian language and involving the creative process to discover the depths of meaning in them. It’s about understanding how each of the stories of God’s people connects with the child’s own experience and relationship with God. Godly Play respects the innate spirituality of children and encourages curiosity and imagination in experiencing the mystery and joy of God.

The goal of Godly Play is to show how to be open to the Holy Spirit, the Creator, and the Redeemer all at once and all the time in every place. To achieve this goal is to help children become deeply rooted as Christians, and yet at the same time use this powerful language and community to be open and creative.
